

New Jersey passed P.L. 2023, c.75 which was signed into law October 30, 2023, expanding the income limit and simplifying the residency requirements for new Senior Freeze program applicants. The Senior Freeze Program reimburses eligible senior citizens and disabled persons for property tax or mobile home park site fee increases on their principal residence (main home). Gloucester Town Corner by Patrick Ward

Gloucester City - New Jersey is commemorating the 400th Anniversary of the first European contact with the Lenni Lenape and the first European settlement on the Delaware River this year.

Summary of the "Battle of Gloucester -NJ" 24, 25, 26 & 27 of Nov. 1777

Nearly 4,500 British troops occupied Gloucester Town under the command of General Lord Cornwallis. While in Gloucester Town they would be foraging in the areas around the Newton Creek, Little Timber Creek and Big Timber Creek. Collecting 400 head of Cattle, horses, pigs, chickens and other food stocks to take with them into winter quarters in Philadelphia.

They had just come from destroying Fort Mercer at Red Bank (present day National Park NJ). With the fort now destroyed, the Delaware River is open to the British Navy to supply their army in Philadelphia. The marquis de Lafayette would lead American Troops. The young Frenchman would take a small force of troops against a Hessian outpost guarding the King's Highway bridge that crossed the King's Run branch of the Newton Creek. (continued on page 3)



Sheriff Ellis's House

When you are at Freedom Pier, be sure to check out the new historical sign. Sheriff Ellis was a political and military leader of southern New Jersey fighting for the cause of Liberty during the Revolution. Ellis's house also served as British General Lord Cornwallis's headquarters during the Nov. 1777 occupation of Gloucester Town.

Starting in present day Haddon Heights and Audubon into Mt. Ephraim the Hessians would be driven back into what is present day Gloucester City. There are three version maps of the Battle of Gloucester. All three are considered to have been by Michel Capitaine du Chesnoy, the skilled cartographer who served as the Marquis de Lafayette's aide-de-camp during the American Revolutionary War.



NEW MUSEUM PASS-NSA WILDWOOD AVIATION MUSEUM

The Gloucester City Library is excited to announce a new museum has been added to our Museum Pass Program! The Naval Air Station Wildwood Aviation Museum, located in Cape May, NJ, is housed in a historic World War II-era all-wood hangar which was assembled by the U.S. Navy in 1942 from a kit delivered via railroad!


From 1943 to 1945, the hangar was part of the Naval Air Station Wildwood where bomber squadrons were trained before serving in the Pacific theater. After World War II, the hangar was owned by multiple companies until it was abandoned several decades later.. In 1997, the nonprofit NASW Foundation restored the building and eventually opened the aviation museum to the public. The museum's collection includes over 25 historic airplanes, jets, and helicopters dating back to World War II.

During your visit, sit in the cockpit of a historic plane or enter an authentic air traffic control tower. Visit the 1940s room to view memorabilia and artifacts from life during World War II. For more information on this museum, please visit this website.

The Museum Pass can be borrowed for up to 3 days by an adult cardholder in good standing. The pass allows free admission for 2 adults and 4 children. Please visit the Museum Pass page to learn more.



Gloucester City is now participating in CivicReady. The Camden County Board of Commissioners of Emergency Management (OEM) is now using <u>CivicReady</u> to help keep Camden County residents informed during fires, outages, floods, hurricanes, evacuations, road closures and other emergency events. <u>CivicReady</u> will allow us to quickly alert constituents via voice, text, email and CAP/IPAWS.

This system, combined with our other emergency alert methods, is designed to get emergency messages to you, the public, quickly and effectively. This does not preclude you from calling 911 if you need emergency information; it simply provides an opportunity for us to disseminate critical information to you if and when the need arises.

#### **Leaf Collection Schedule**

2023 Leaf Collection Program will be starting on October 30th, 2023 and will continue until, and finish, the week of December 18th, 2023.

SECTION 1: Woods, Francesville, and the area east of Broadway to Johnson Blvd., and north of Monmouth St. to Sherman St. This section will be done during the weeks of: October 30th and November 27th, 2023.

SECTION 2: Highland Park, Riverview Hts., and the area west of Broadway to King St., and south of Market St. to Jersey Ave. This section will be done during the weeks of: November 6th and December 4th, 2023.

SECTION 3: Cypress Gardens, Park Manor, and

Gloucester Heights. This section will be done during the weeks of: November 13th and December 11th, 2023.

SECTION 4: The area west of Broadway bounded by Broadway on the east, the City line on the north, Market St. on the south and the Delaware River on west. This section will be done during the weeks of: November 20th and December 18th, 2023.
